above and beyond in moving the records in the Archive in the Gladish Building to the lower level of the Congregational Church," said the Society's director **Valoree Gregory**. When the tenants of Gladish were given only two weeks to vacate the building, Alex flew into action. He helped find a new location and worked with the movers—as well as by himself, personally moving many artifacts to storage in Steptoe. "We never could have gotten moved in time without Alex," said Val. Alex welcomes users to visit the new location in the church, in Suite 102 (accessible from Ruby Street) on Wednesdays 9:00 AM to noon or by appointment.

Alex supervises a crew of six volunteers at the Archive. On Saturdays he also volunteers at the Print Museum in Palouse, where he is compiling a database of Colfax newspapers, many of which were damaged in the 1996 flood. Museum director **Janet Barstow** says she very much appreciates that he frequently steps in as a docent when needed.

Update on PDHC Railcar Restoration, by Debbie Sherman

Preliminary work on the railcars at the Pullman Depot Heritage Center has been paused due to weather constraints, according to **John-Mark Mahnkey**, rolling stock chairperson.

Unforeeen complications arose that slowed paint removal from the cars, and applying new paint during colder months does not produce an optimum finish.



Work will resume in the spring when the tenting will be removed, said Mahnkey. The coach will be restored to its original Northern Pacific color scheme, while the caboose will sport the Burlington Northern palette.

Fundraising continues this fall and winter to pay for the cars' restoration. Some naming rights and sponsorships are still available to replace the current coach windows with more accurately styled windows. Painting and repairs at the Perkins house are finished! Work began in early August and ended in October. In addition to paint, spindles and some of the ornate trim were replaced and/or repaired, and cracks were sealed. The balcony railings were also repaired. The project cost approximtely \$100,000. WCHS Archive Move Finished!

Summarized from an article in the WCGS Newsletter by Sue Kreikemeier

After 38 years in the Gladish Community Building in Pullman (beginning in June of 1987), WCHS was forced to move its Archive to a new location. In a letter dated August 28, 2025, Gladish tenants were given until Sept. 15 (when the electricity was turned off) to vacate the premises, so that the



building can be sold. In only a little over two weeks, a new location was found. The move—to the basement of the Community Congregational United Church of Christ, 525 NE Campus Street in Pullman—was completed by Sept 18, and the Archive reopened only two weeks later.

The Whitman County Genea-logical Society also made the move, as it had been sharing space with WCHS since 1992, paying about thirty percent of the rent. WCHS and WCGS have separate but adjoining rooms at CCUCC, and they will be open for the same hours that they maintained in the Gladish Building: Wednesday mornings from 9:00 AM to noon and by appointment. New Exhibit at the Depot

Jamie Whitman, Karla Dolph, and Debbie Sherman have put together a colorful and interesting exhibit on the Washington State University Marching Band. The museum's cement-block main building was constructed in 1920 for use as a funeral parlor. Later

the facility was donated by its owners, the Merchant family, to be used as a museum. In 1972, it officially became the Asotin County Historical Society Museum. It also houses the Asotin County Historical Society Archive.

In addition to the main building, the property is home to several other buildings, including a barn, blacksmith shop, pioneer home, school, and sheepherders shack—as well as a river boat. Each is with artifacts, and some of the buildings are constructed with square nails. According to the Museum's advertising, visitors will "experience the frontier as settlers did!"

The Museum is open from March to October. Tours are by appointment. The staff recommends calling before you come, and making an appointment for a tour is recommended.



Janet Barstow (Palouse) retired as the secretary of the WCHS Board of Directors last spring, a position she had held for many years. She has also been in charge of the Roy Chatters Newspaper and Print Museum in Palouse for 25 years and continues in that position.



She is largely responsible for rallying the people of Palouse around the Print Museum—especially restoring and repairing it—after massive damage caused by the Palouse Rver flood of 1996.

WCHS is not her only volunteer activity. Janet is a founding member of Haunted Palouse, which began as a fund raiser to complete repairs to Print Museum after the flood. Another community project dear to her heart is the Palouse Community Center, where she was a long-time member of the Board. Both projects were funded in part by Haunted Palouse, on whose Board she remained until the project was completed. She and her husband Ben are also members of the Palouse Chamber of Commerce.

Janet clearly loves Palouse, where she has lived nearly all her life. After graduating from Palouse High School, she attended the University of Idaho and graduated from Purdue University, where she earned a bachelor's degree in Communications. She and Ben have two children and five grandchildren. The Barstows own and operate Turnbow Flat Farm, which was established in 1883 by Janet's paternal ancestors.

When asked why she devotes so much of her time to volunteer for WCHS, Janet said that running the print museum as a volunteer is "my gift to my town."
