## **Lost Apple Virtual Propagation Fair**

Featuring apple scions supplied by mail and custom grafted apple trees for pickup in person, as well as apricot, cherry, pear, and plum scions.

Are you planning to start an orchard, expand an existing one, or simply plant a unique fruit tree in your yard? Until February 10, apple scions and newly grafted apple trees can be ordered from the Lost Apple Project, via The Fruit House. Scions are \$6 and newly grafted trees are \$35. Unless your order is over \$100, payment will not be required until your scions are mailed (mid-March) or until you pick up your grafted trees (circa July 10), in Pullman or Spokane. Many "lost," rare, and heritage varieties are available.

According to their website, they will work with you to make sure you get the tree(s) you want. For example, if you want a really good early apple, order the Sary Sinap, which ripens in late July or early August. Would you like to know what the best August apple is? The Pristine apple is incredible! Excellent September apples are the Fall Jeneting and Arkansas Beauty. Most

formerly "lost" apples ripen in October. Five cider apple trees are also available. Fall apples always keep longer in your cellar or refrigerator than early season apples.

Look forward to giving your taste buds a treat by placing your order now! Explore the variety of these once lost but now rediscovered heritage apples.

# Next BookTalk at the Depot: "Ida Lou Anderson and the Architecture of the WSU Pullman Campus," by Trevor James Bond and Phil Gruen

Join us at the Depot on Thursday, February 29, for a pair of illustrated presentations on *The Ida Lou Anderson House: A Personal, Social, and Architectural History,* by two of its three authors. The program will begin at 7:00 PM in the Freight Room on the northwest end of the building.





The first, by Dr. Trevor Bond, will examine the life of a remarkable Washington State College faculty member and graduate of Colfax High School who taught at WSC from 1926 to 1939. She trained and inspired a generation of broadcasters, including Edward R. Murrow—perhaps WSU's most famous alumnus.

The second, by Dr. Phil Gruen, will explore the growth of the Pullman campus under the Holland administration and the embrace of the Gregorian revival style in creating a new identity for Washington's land grant college.

Louis Vyhnanek has been volunteering at the WCHS Archive, located in the Gladish Building in Pullman, since shortly after his retirement in January of 2015. Lou has a master's degree in History from the University of South Florida, as well as a second master's in Library Science and a PhD in History from Louisiana State University. He has also served on the WSU Press Editorial Board for many years—longer than any other board member, he suspects. Lou and his wife Kay, who also retired from the WSU Libraries in 2015, have two daughters and one grandson.

His main duties at the Archive are processing and organizing donations and collections. He numbers and places materials into Past Perfect, a computer program that allows researchers to search the WCHS collections—which are grouped by families, areas in Whitman County, and books on particular subjects or by the same author. He also works with historic photographs. Collection materials are usually limited to Whitman County.

When asked why he devotes so much of his time to WCHS, Lou said, "I have a background in history, lots of reference experience, and I am particularly interested in local history, so the Archive is a good place for me to spend time in retirement. I especially enjoy helping people do research on their families."

We worked in the old wooden Northern Pacific Depot in Pullman in the summer of 1912.
