<u>Next WCHS Major Event:</u> <u>Vintage Quilt Show at the Depot</u>



April 20, April 27, and May 4, 12:00 PM to 5:00 PM in the Freight Room and the Passenger Car

The Pullman Depot's Vintage Quilt Show will once again exhibit quilted treasures of the past, on loan from area residents. Visitors to the Freight Room and Passenger Car on the above days can look forward to seeing handmade quilts and comforters that are normally

unavailable for public viewing. Information on each quilt pattern and its creator(s) will also be displayed. A number of other handwork items—such as crocheted doilies, handmade lace, and embroidered pillowcases— will also be on view. The cost is \$5 per person for the general public and \$3 each for WCHS members.

Join us on Saturday morning, March 20, at 10:00 AM, in the Ladies' Waiting Room at the Depot to hear Pullman mayor **Francis Benjamin** speak about his mother's quilts, some of which will be on display in the Freight Room. **Garnet Benjamin** made over 200 quilts during her lifetime, several of which are part of this year's quilt show. The program is free of charge. On Saturday, May 4, the Appaloosa Lace Guild from Moscow will be demonstrating bobbin lace making.

If you have a vintage quilt or handwork item that you would like to loan to the Depot for the quilt show, contact Freight Room director **Jamie Whitman** at jwhitman97@yahoo.com or 509-332-1005. Quilts and handwork should be at least 40 years old. Lenders will be admitted to the Quilt Show at no cost.

Youth group members from Moscow's Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints recently spent a morning at the Roy Chatters Newspaper and Printing Museum learning about the history of printing and the artistry of letterpress printing. Pictured are some of the students working on the first project they completed: setting their names with hand-set type, then printing and making a bookmark. They also all got to print a souvenir flyer on an 1877 Chandler and Price platen press, operated by foot power.

The museum, which is located on Main Street in Palouse, is open Saturdays from 10:00 AM to 2:00 PM. Group tours are welcome with prior

Rock Lake Legend to be Explored, by Greg May

It is not very often that curious folk are afforded an opportunity to definitively solve a generational mystery, such as the local belief that a train derailed into Rock Lake back in the 1920s. Many believe that at least one train car—and perhaps more—was carrying a load of Model T's, which are today still lying at the bottom of the lake.

Jake Powlisons, a professional salvage/recovery diver, and his team have agreed to search the portion of Rock Lake that has been surveyed as the only point of entry in the lake that could hide an object the size of a train car. He and his team have the type of equipment that

scans underwater terrain in deep waters regardless of turbidity.

The search area is relatively small and any remnants of a train car will certainly be located if such a thing exists (the sonar is extremely precise).

Anyone who helps fund the expedition (estimated at \$6 to \$12K) is welcome to tag along during the search. Once funding is acquired, the expedition will be scheduled.

Two Palouse People Programs Coming Up:

March 21: Kathy Meyer, "Women Homesteaders on the Palouse"

7:00 PM, Freight Room, Pullman Depot Heritage Center

Did you know that nearly twenty percent of homesteaders in the Mid-west and West were single women, divorcees, and widows? The Homestead Act, signed by President Abraham Lincoln in 1962, granted 160 acres of unappropriated public land to anyone of any race who was the head of a household—mostly men. Each prospective homesteader had to pay a small filing fee, agree to farm and live on the land for five years, and "improve" the land by building a home. Single men and women over 21 were also eligible, but married women were not.

In celebration of Women's History Month, Kathy Meyer will discuss some of the women who homesteaded on the Palouse on their own, whose hard work and endurance and indeed their very names—historians have only just begun to study.

April 20 : Francis Benjamin, "A Quilter's Legacy" 10:00 AM, Women's Waiting Room, Pullman Depot Heritage Center



Francis Benjamin will share his mother's quilting legacy and the impact she continues to have on people's lives. **Garnet Benjamin** didn't start quilting until she was 50; and in the following 35 years she completed over 220 quilts, over 380 quilted wall hangings and minis, and passed her passion on to others.

Jamie Whitman's name was drawn from our jar of volunteers' names for this issue of the newsletter. Jamie is the director of the Freight Room at the Pullman Depot, as well as the liaison between the Depot and the Pullman Chamber of Commerce and the Pullman Civic



Trust. She excels at creating interesting exhibits at the Depot—she designs a new one every few months so that there will always be something new for

visitors to see when they come by. She also oversees Depot interns from Washington State University and provides home-baked refreshments for Depot Programs (BookTalk and Palouse People). Jamie was named WCHS Volunteer of the Year in 2021, which was well-deserved recognition for all the work she does at the Depot.

Jamie grew up in Pullman and graduated from PHS. She worked at the high school cafeteria until her retirement in 2016 and was a Boy Scout volunteer when her two sons were young. Her husband Bill is retired from the Pullman Fire Department. The couple has seven grandchildren and numerous nieces and nephews. Members of her family often volunteer at the Depot because of Jamie's interest and enthusiasm.

When asked why she volunteers so much of her time to the Depot, she said, "It's fun! And I like contributing to my community."

One of the Women Working at the Depot Identified!

Alex Otero, director of the WCHS Archive in Pullman, was able to identify one of the women working at the lunch counter in the Pullman Depot, shown in a photo that was featured in the last newsletter. The woman on the left is Blanche Rambo, a native of Moscow, who was manager of lunch counter when the photo was takin in 1912. She later managed depot lunch counters in the Tri-Cities and in Montana.
