## Port Commissioners Donate \$35,000 to the Depot!

The Whitman County Port Commissioners have approved a one-time gift of \$35,000 to the Depot. Steering Committee members **Debbie Sherman** and **Ken Cassavant** met with them on Wednesday, September 3, when they presented an update on progress at the Depot and future plans and financial needs. The money is earmarked for exterior railcar restoration.

"This Wonderful Place: *The Desert of Wheat* as Seen by Novelist Zane Grey and Other Viewers Since Pioneer Days

PowerPoint by Richard Scheuerman; talk by Alex McGregor.

This year's program at the WCHS Annual Meeting will feature the efforts of two historians—Whitman County natives and authors Richard Scheuerman and Alex McGregor. Scheuerman credits McGregor with introducing him to *The Desert of Wheat*.

The story, which was written in 1919, centers on a young German-American farmer who faces the challenges of running a large wheat farm and dealing with the IWW (Wobblies) and anti-German sentiment in the United States during World War I. Part of the novel is set in war-torn France, but primarily, "Grey's narrative is rich with descriptions of the wheat fields and rural life, painting a vivid picture of American agriculture during wartime," says Scheuerman. Note that Grey visited the Columbia Plateau and the Palouse in 1917 to gather information for the book.





Come to the Annual Meeting to learn more about *The Desert of Wheat*, which Scheuerman says still offers new insights into the era and the region, even though the story is now over 100 years old. The yearly WCHS business meeting and refreshments will follow.

garbanzo beans (chickpeas). Work in progress on the train cars could also be seen (see p. 3).

# WCHS at the Palouse Empire Fair

Approximately 482 visitors stopped by the Jones Schoolhouse while they were at the Palouse Empire Fair, September 4-7! Minilessons and docent-led tours of the schoolhouse were again featured. On Thursday, WCHS volunteer teachers gave fourteen mini-lessons to visiting third-graders; and on Friday, Schweitzer Engineering gave three lessons on electricity. The Perkins house is getting major improvements. It has hired a contractor and painters, and work started in early


August. Over the years, the spindles and some of the ornate trim had fallen off the house, and the balcony railings also needed to be repaired. Plus, there are

cracks and peeling paint. So, these things are being fixed. The missing pieces are being replicated, cracks are being sealed, and the house is being primed and painted with the same colors as the last paint project. The project is costing \$100,000, but 75 percent of that has already been raised. So, more help is needed to finish the project. # **Tenting at the Depot!**

Work has begun on the train cars at the Pullman Depot. The first step was surrounding the passenger car and caboose with framework for heavy-duty plastic so that the peeling paint and rust can be sandblasted off the exterior of the cars and so that they will be protected from the weather. The deteriorating metal can then be repaired, and painting with appropriate railcar/automotive paint will begin. Windows replicating the original ones with curved corners will also



#### WCHS Archive Forced to Move

Pullman's longtime community center, which has housed the WCHS Archive well over 25 years, is closing, announced the Friends of Gladish Board of Directors during the last week of August. Tenants have until September 15 to leave.

The closure comes after months of publicly announced financial troubles. In December of 2024, the board revealed that the Gladish Community & Cultural Center was in a financial crisis; it put the building up for sale in July.



Originally consisting of three buildings, the oldest parts of the facility were built in 1892. In its early years, it served all of Pullman's students, but it was converted to Pullman High School in 1913. (Above is a drawing of the building from 1933.) In 1972, the "new high school" on Greyhound Way replaced it; however, the School District did not sell the Gladish Building to the Friends of Gladish until 1996. Hundreds of thousands of dollars have been poured into its maintenance and restoration over the years, especially the last 29. It has hosted countless public events, private gatherings, plays, and concerts; and it has housed a wide variety of schools and offices, non-profit organizations, and private companies.

WCHS was forced to relocate the Archive in only a little over two weeks. The new location is at the Community Congregational United Church of Christ on 525 NE Campus Street in Pullman. WCHS appreciates their willingness to help! Thanks also to the Steptoe Grange Hall and the City of Rosalia for showing the Society other possible locations.

#### Featured Museum: WSU Museum of Anthropology



The Museum of Anthropology at Washington State Univerity in Pullman is located on the first floor of College Hall, on Glen Terrell Mall. It was established in 1957.

More than 30,000 artifacts from throughout the world, dating from ancient to modern times, are housed by the museum. They are organized geographically (North America, Latin America, Africa, and Oceania). Permanent exhibits include the Robert E. and Priscilla K. Nason collections of Native American Art, African Art, and Latin American Art. In addition, the museum

displays rotating exhibits, including a current one on the archaeology of the Pacific Northwest.

The museum is open to the public and admission is free. Hours during the school year are 10 AM to 4 PM, Monday through Saturday; and 1 PM to 4 PM on Sunday. **Sid Pierson** has been a member of the Steering Committee for the Pullman Depot Heritage Center since 2018. His keen interest in Whitman County's history stems from his grandfather, whose family purchased a homestead farm in the St. John/Hay area in 1903



Sid is past owner of Sid's Pharmacy, located in the Pullman Care Community. After graduating from Pullman High School, he earned degrees in zoology and psychology from Washington State University, then served in the U.S. Army during the Vietnam War. His interest in trains stems from his military service; he was originally interested in flying but was assigned to trains instead. Afterward, he returned to Pullman and earned a degree from WSU's School of Pharmacy. He served twelve years on the Pullman Schools Board of Directors and was a member of the Executive Directors Committee of the Washington School Directors' Association.

When asked why he volunteers at the Depot, he said, "The community supported my pharmacy for many, many years, and volunteering is one way to give back. Besides, I like trains!"
