## Funding Cut For Whitman Rural Heritage Project

According to an article in the *Whitman County Gazette* (April 19, 2025), by Teresa Simpson, the Whitman County Library has been forced to cancel the Whitman County Digital Project, part of the Washington Rural Heritage progect. It has been funded by a grant from the Institute of Museum and Library Service, whose acting director, Keith Sonderling, ordered the cancellation of all 2024-2025 projects as of Tuesday, April 1. Local project manager Hollyanna Hahn reported that "IMLS has been completely stripped."

The Whitman County Rural Heritage Collection contains approximately 5,300 historically significant items that were collected by the library and local volunteers. It contains photographs, artifacts, documents, and videos that pertain to the culture of Whitman County, particularly its early community life, agriculture, and business and industry—all available online. It also contains a great deal of genealogical information on early families. The county digital project was receiving \$17,000, but without funding for its website, it will be difficult to maintain it, preserve it, or move forward.

A lawsuit to reverse the cancellation has been filed by the Washington Attorney General, whose office has stated, "It is illegal to terminate a grant program already approved by Congress."

Hahn said that the library's goal is to prevent the project's disappearance. The library is working with a technician to determine if there is any way it will be able to maintain the website without grant money. It is also considering approaching Washington State University and asking whether or not it might take over the project. We want to make sure, she said, that "it is preserved in the most accessible form" so that "our community still has access to these wonderful documents."

## NEXT PALOUSE PEOPLE AT THE DEPOT: "FALLEN COUGARS"

#### THURSDAY, MAY 22, 7:00 PM

"Fallen Cougars" will be the subject of the Memorial Day program at the Pullman Depot Freight Room. Several history faculty and students, who work with the Washington State University World War II Commemoration Project, will speak on military personnel who lost their lives during the war—each had a connection to WSU as a student, faculty member, or alumnus.

According to project director **Raymond Sun** (Albion), "By presenting the photos and life stories of the generation of Cougars who died in the fight against fascism and militarism, the project aims to restore the humanity and spirit of the approximately 250 WSC war dead, transforming them from names on a plaque to young men to whom contemporary Cougars and the public can readily relate. It is intended



to serve both as a scholarly resource and a means to advance public understanding and appreciation for the service and legacy of these former Cougars in this defining moment of history." ## FEATURED MUSEUM: THE HOOPER GENERAL STORE



The privately owned Hooper General Store now 110 years old—is located in the town of Hooper, which straddles the line between Whitman and Adams Counties. The current brick builting replaced the wooden original, which was built in 1901 by a McGregor relative, James S. Thomas. It was purchased only two years later by the McGregor brothers (Archie, Peter, John, and Alex), but the store burned to the ground in December of 1915, while "everybody in town" was ice

skating on Clear Lake, said **Alex McGregor** (Pullman). The fire was particularly bad luck for his father, 9-year-old Sherman McGregor, because he had discovered that his parents had bought him a BB gun for Christmas and had hidden it behind the counter.

Alex's grandfather, Alex C. McGregor (1869-1952) operated the store for 35 years, followed by his son Sherman. It closed in 1977 but is still standing today, carefully restored by the McGregor family, who have added "some historic tidbits and interesting things to see to give a flavor of the rural and agricultural history of this region." Today it serves as a community center and has hosted numerous concerts, weddings, meetings, retirement parties, and even celebrations of life.

**Pat Flansburg** (Palouse) has been a member of the WCHS Board of Directors for 22 years, ever since she approached it in 2003 to see if the Society would be interested in sponsoring the purchase and preservation of Holy Trinity Chapel in Palouse. A former Episcopal church, it had been put up for sale by the Diocese of



Spokane, and many worried that it would be torn down or repurposed into a house. Almost single-handedly, Pat raised the money to buy it—which was paid for in only five years. Today she oversees its upkeep and use.

Holy Trinity was built in 1896. Both its original interior and exterior have been carefully maintained, with no substantive changes over the last nearly 130 years, other than reroofing, re-siding, and repainting. Great care has been taken to retain its original appearance. The chapel is also noteworthy for its lych gate, one of only seven in the United States.

In addition to her work for WCHS, Pat volunteered extensively for the elementary school in Palouse when her two children were younger; in particular, she was a founding member of SACK (Support and

Caring for Kids). In addition to their grown son and daughter, Pat and her husband Doug have four grandchildren.

When asked why she donates her time to WCHS, Pat said, "I like being involved with the chapel, but unfortunately, it no longer has any other volunteers, so it's left to me alone to take care of it. It's an important part of the history of Palouse and its people, especially those who are now gone."

Located at 105 E. Alder Street in Palouse, Holy Trinity Chapel is available to rent for small weddings, funerals, recitals, or similar events. Please contact Pat (509-878-1826 or pflans@gmail.com) if you are interested in volunteering, or renting the building for an event.
